MISCELLANEOUS EDITORIAL WORK

During 1982-3 I worked on the memoirs of a close friend, Max Granich (1896-1987) child of immigrants, draft resister in World War I, organizer for the Industrial Workers of the World and other progressive labor organizations, volunteer in the Soviet industrialization effort, participant in the Chinese Revolution, founder and director of summer camp for children of the victims of McCarthyism, leader in the Chinese-American Friendship Association, and husband of (the late) Grace Granich who was the long time director of the central office of the Communist Party USA. Using oral history techniques a manuscript record of about 800 pages was elicited. Mr.

Granich's advanced years slowed and eventually precluded the development of a finished, publishable memoir. The manuscript material has been placed with the Tamiment Library of New York University and is available to scholars; it has been consulted in a number of cases, most notably for a history of Americans in old China by Professor Thomas Gruenfeld of Empire State College and by Harrison Salisbury for his book on the Long March.

LECTURES

During 1966-70 I earned a substantial part of my income on the lecture circuit. In the event, I was invited to speak at over 140 different university campuses, often returning for a follow-up talk. Earlier those lectures focused on Vietnamese and Cold War subjects; later and to the present, on the social organization and impact of modern technology and on working class and trade union topics.
